# Lifetime Achievement Award goes to Jane & Horst Paetzold

Louise Davis presented the award to Jane and Horst, sometimes having to ask Jane to be quiet. Jane was almost in tears; it was such a big surprise to her.

Below is a recap of the nomination letter that went to the Board. Unfortunately, the people who nominated them were unable to attend this convention.

I'd like to recommend the team of Jane and Horst
Paetzold for the LAA for 2025. Together they epitomize
what collecting shakers, championing the Club, and interacting with fellow collectors is all about. Jane's massive enthusiasm for all things shakers is
tempered by Horst's efficient management of events.

Jane joined the Club in 1994 when she found a card from the Club at an antique store. Horst joined the Club in 2001, in time for their first convention in Ohio.

Collecting shakers has been a passion for Jane for nearly 50 years, with Horst contributing his cabinet building skills to house an ever-growing collection. Jane and Horst were introduced to the earlier Canadian chapter of QuebOnt, in the early 1990's, when collectors from both Ontario and Quebec met three times a year. However, with the retirement of the President from Quebec, the Quebec members decamped, resulting in a new chapter exclusively for Ontario: Shakers, Eh? Initially, Horst held several roles: President, Treasurer, and Editor of the fantastic chapter newsletter that comes out three times a year. He still has the role of Vice President and Editor. Jane took over the role of President and has held that position for many years, adding her flavour and flourish to the always lively chapter meetings. Jane and Horst generally host every second chapter meeting. Whether the meeting is at her house or not, Jane supplies at least one, often two games. She also provides raffle prizes, and she often gives a small presentation.

Together Jane and Horst produce the chapter newsletter, perhaps the most important tool for spreading the enjoyment of collecting; typically, each issue is 20-30 pages long. Many of the articles, mostly written by Jane and Horst, are reproduced in the national club's newsletter.

Jane and Horst belong to several other chapters and attend meetings whenever they can, travelling long distances in order to enjoy the company of shaker friends more than once a year at convention.

Jane and Horst have attended every convention since 2001, gradually taking on more roles as volunteers. Horst worked the auctions as a runner, then took over the job of Photographer. Jane loves to help with the auction shakers coming in. She always brings toys and treats for the junior members and loves meeting first time attendees. Together Jane and Horst made many large displays and won prizes for their efforts. Horst was a speaker for two conventions, talking about Disney shakers and then Comic ones. Jane keeps detailed notes during convention (including a list of auction entries and their selling price) and writes a comprehensive article for the chapter's fall newsletter. Horst adds his pictures of displays, costumes, the convention set, and general convention highlights. This issue of the newsletter is usually over 30 pages. Folks who were unable to attend convention can experience it all through the newsletter. In the past few years, Jane's convention articles have also been published in the national newsletter, as have Horst's articles "Horst and Jane's Finds," which describe successful shaker hunts and always provide wonderful photos.

Where Horst is always concise, Jane's articles provide colour and liveliness.

In 2021, Horst decided to take the next step in support of the national club and took the BOD position of Vice President. At the time, in preparing for the 2023 New Jersey Convention, his focus was to ensure successful replacement of the convention Chairs. 2023 saw Horst become the President of the Club. Looking for future conventions led him to become Chair for the 2026 Convention with the Ontario and Michigan chapters supporting this endeavour. Recognizing the difficulty in getting chapters to sponsor conventions, Horst introduced a modified process for developing conventions, a process that divides the work into four major elements. This process will be used for 2028 and 2029 conventions if no chapters come forward.

Getting new members into the Club has been one of Horst's goals as president. Advertising on Google, Facebook, and Instagram is now being pursued to reach as many collectors as possible on the web.

With all their passion, joy, and commitment to collecting shakers and progressing the Club, Jane and Horst Paetzold would be ideal recipients of the Lifetime Achievement Award.



### Webmaster Report, Josh Weaver

It looks like the convention was a great success. It was strange missing all the excitement this year. Next year's convention logo and preliminary information was put on the website immediately after its announcement. Although with that change the website has had two new featured articles published this quarter on Limoges and Quimper pottery. You can check the new articles out and the other backlog of 44 featured articles straight from your Dashboard on the club's website once you have logged in. Here is a sneak peak.

### Limoges

Limoges, France is about 200 miles south of Paris and has been known for its porcelain products for over 250 years. The surrounding region, called Limousine, was discovered to have the correct materials in its earth to create the hard paste porcelain.

Limoges porcelain was at is pinnacle in the late 19th century and early 20th century, with the mass production of table ware for the American export market. Art objects, including figural salt and pepper shakers, were also created albeit in a much smaller quantity in both the pre-WWII and increasingly in the post-WWII era.

### Quimper

Kempar was the original name of the small village that was established by the Celts in the 5th century near the southern coast of Brittany. The village was named "Kemper" (which means "confluence"), because

circa 1942-68

two rivers - the Steir River and Odet River -come together here. These ivers played an important economic role in the production and export of goods. Now the much larger city of Quimper (pronounced "cam-pair" or "kem"-"pair") and the people of Brittany are proud of their Celtic heritage and have been known for their production of faience with "petit Breton" decor for over three hundred years.

Quimper pottery started in 1690 by Jean-Baptiste Bousquet when he built his first kilns in the Locmaria area of the city of Quimper. His sons, Charles and son-in-law Pierre Caussy, continued the family legacy through the 18th century. Bousquet's faiencerie was later called Grande Maison. Later, Caussy's son-in-law called Antoine de la Hubeaudiere succeeded and direct the faiencerie until 1915. He registered their first mark, "HB" in 1882 and the Grande Maison HB company was born. The "HB" representing the first letter of the last names of Hubeaudiere (H) and Bousquet (B). In 1904 their second registered mark became "HB Quimper".

In the late 18th century, two other Quimper companies were created. The first was created in the 1770s by a former employee of Grande Maison called Francois Eloury. After being run throughout the 1800s by a series of family members (i.e. Charles Porquier, Auguste Porquier, etc.) and the addition of noted artist Alfred Beau in 1872, the company became Porquier-Beau with the trademark "PB". The second was created in 1778 by Guillaume Dumaine. Dumaine's faiencerie was managed by succeeding generations until Jules Henriot assumed the management of the family business that eventually beared his name, Henriot Quimper. The first marked became "HR" - the "H" for Henriot and the "R" for his wife's maiden name. In 1913, Henriod purchased the remnants of the Porquier factory that had previously shuttered.

Finally in 1968, HF and HB Quimper merged forming Faienceries de Quimper. In 1983 it failed, but soon was reopened in 1984 by American importers Paul and Sarah Janssens. In 2003, Pierre Chiron reclaimed French ownership in the company, but the company faltered and in 2011 was purchased by Jean Piere Le Goff who changed the name to Henriot Quimper.




### Wanted: Club Member Shaker Stories
